



Otolaryngologist – Head and Neck Surgeon

The Department of Surgery, Section of Otolaryngology, and Alberta Health Services invite applications for a major clinical position as a General Otolaryngologist – Head and Neck Surgeon. The Department of Surgery requires applicants to have completed a minimum 1-year post-residency fellowship or a Master's degree in a related field.

Dedication to maintaining a general pediatric otolaryngology office and surgical practice is mandatory. Operating and ambulatory clinic privileges at the Alberta Children's Hospital are provided. The ideal candidate will have acquired training or experience in clinical or basic science research related to otolaryngology. A Master's degree in Clinical Epidemiology, Education or similar is advantageous.

The surgeon will practice at the Peter Lougheed Centre, Alberta Children's Hospital and the Otolaryngology Clinic at the Richmond Road Diagnostic and Treatment Centre. Membership in the University of Calgary Medical Group is required.

The successful candidate will teach and evaluate residents and medical students in various settings including clinical encounters and surgeries, didactic lectures and seminars and surgical simulation.

The recruited surgeon will support the mission of the University of Calgary and Department of Surgery by participating in clinical outcomes and other research projects in related to their chosen field.

The position is to commence in the fall of 2013.
